## “Power of his Resurrection”



*“I want to know Christ—yes, to know the power of his resurrection and participation in his sufferings, becoming like him in his death...”*

*Philippians 3v10*

It's a while since the day when a deacon in the Dumfries Church drew my attention to the phrase at the heart of

Philippians 3:10: “To know the power of his resurrection.” But since that day, when I face challenges, times of despair, where hope seems gone, this phrase often comes to mind.

“The power of his resurrection” was clearly the power to change death to life.

This Easter as every Easter we celebrate that Christ is alive.

We rejoice together in the presence of the risen and exalted Jesus.

Like the disciples on the road to Emmaus we recognise that resurrection has the power to transform deserters to followers.

Like Peter we see it has the power to change Deniers to

proclaimers and, in Thomas, we are reminded that doubters can have faith, such is the power of the resurrection.

However, for me, the surprising thing about this phrase is its position in the verse. It precedes a reference to Jesus' suffering and death. It feels that it is the wrong way round chronologically.

Yet Paul places things in the order that the believer experiences them today.

I believe he is saying that those who know Christ and experience the power of the resurrection can now share in His suffering. In other words any suffering can be entered into in the context of resurrection and therefore with hope.

More than that, it also means that the power of his resurrection equips and enables us to choose the descending way of Christ, outlined in Philippians 2.

As each of us seek to live under the rule of Christ, and as churches we seek to live under the rule of Christ, His risen power is made available to strengthen us, keep us and lead us in His ways

### Sunday 3rd

**Renfrew: Rev Brian Luse.** Please pray:

1. That God's glory would be seen, heard and sensed in all that occurs within the walls of the church. (1 Cor 10:31)

We praise God for the many new young children we have worshipping with us. I am told that about two and a half years ago there was maybe one young family in the church. Recently, we have seen 20 creche to primary aged kids on Sunday and we could not be more excited that God has blessed us in this way! (Matt 19:14). Thank you for your prayers, we greatly appreciate them!

**Rosyth: Rev Gilmour Lilly.** We praise God: for many contacts with people who don't know Jesus; for Our "Gateway" coffee shop, which continues to be well attended, and a couple of Ceilidhs in the past six months which have been great relationship builders with the community; for those who recently committed themselves to Church membership; that, almost a year in, house groups are proving beneficial; for the increasing sense of freedom and joy in our worship.

However, the challenges we face are significant. Please pray with us about: our building - in particular the condition of the older part, where we gather for Sunday worship, which is causing concern. We have important and potentially far-reaching decisions to make about this; for plans for using the "Try Praying" booklet as an outreach tool during the run up towards Easter - along with other Baptist

Churches in Fife. Pray that the venture will release church folks to engage in sharing their faith. Pray for courage and sensitivity; pray for the possibility of an inter-church act of witness on Palm Sunday and for developing creative and appropriate ways of engaging spiritually with visitors to our Thursday "Gateway" coffee shop.

### Sunday 10th

**Rothsay.** We give thanks to God for guidance and provision for us during our year of vacancy. We ask for your prayers for our new vacancy committee, when they have their initial meeting, on 26th March. Pray too for guidance and wisdom as we select a new Diaconate

We are most grateful to those who have led our Sunday services and midweek Prayer and Bible Study. We also give God thanks for the united services we share with the other Churches on the Island.

At present we are running the *Alpha* course and pray that this may result in some coming to know the Lord Jesus.

As a fellowship, we give thanks to God for His provision in the past and the sense of His presence now as we trust the future to His love and care.

**Rutherglen: Rev Ken Coulter.** We give thanks for the ongoing development of ARK Out of School Care, providing care for over thirty children every day after school and at school holidays. Please pray for the five staff who run this under the guidance of Katie Paterson. Sadly we had to make one of our full time employees - David Geddes - redundant in January because income did not meet expenditure. Please pray for David and his wife Lockhart as they seek God's future. As a church we look to the future with excitement at the possibilities before us for mission and would ask for guidance for the Leadership Team as decisions are made focusing where energy, prayer and funding should go.

### Sunday 17th

**Saltcoats, South Beach: Rev Vince Jennings.** Give thanks with us for Steven, our new Youth Worker, and for what he's doing in schools and

the community. We thank God too for the progress of our *Alpha Express* meetings; for the *Little Stars* Parent and Todder Group in the Star Inn building in the town and for *Sunday at Six*, our special guest services.

**Sanquhar: Mr Philip Usher.** Please pray for our elderly village congregation who continue to hang in there especially as we seek ways to reach out to the local community. Pray for patience and perseverance during these challenging times. We give thanks for Philip Usher our pastor as he faithfully leads our Sunday Morning worship and midweek prayer and Bible study. Pray for wisdom to discern what we can do in the early summer to serve our neighbours and reach out in Christ's name.

### Sunday 24th


Kenny graduated as a Master of Divinity at Southeastern Baptist Theological Seminary, North Carolina, before moving to Scotland.

# Salt and Light in the Political Realm

Are you already anticipating the wall-to-wall media reporting of the Scottish Parliament election on Thursday, May 5<sup>th</sup>? There will doubtless be, over three or four intensive weeks, detailed analysis of the policies and personalities of the political parties.

Perhaps you've already made a mental note to switch off from the election build-up as much as you can.

And yet we do have a responsibility to be making a distinctive Christian contribution to our nation and its political make-up.

Paul, in his first letter to Timothy, urges 'requests, prayers, intercessions and thanksgiving be made for everyone – for kings and all those in authority.' So prayer should be the foundation of our involvement in our society and its government.

Jesus encourages us to be salt and light in all we do, and there's no mention that this excludes the political realm.

A number of Christian organisations produce resources which make it easier to understand and contribute to the political process. For this election a significant number of organisations and denominations have joined forces in an initiative called



**Churches Vote** ([www.churchesvote.org](http://www.churchesvote.org)) - a demonstration of the unity of the Christian Church in its desire to serve the nation.

The web site also contains a wealth of resources and information to help Christians know what the policies of the parties are, and to explain the political process – somewhat complicated because of the second, regional, vote. There are also film interviews with all the party leaders on the role of the Church in society.

**CARE for Scotland's Make the Cross Count website** ([www.makethecrosscount2011.net/scotland](http://www.makethecrosscount2011.net/scotland))

includes advice on running a hustings meeting, having a prayer calendar, and some intriguing policy suggestions from Christian leaders.



So why not commit to doing three things in the run-up to May 5<sup>th</sup>:

- Pray for God to guide the nation as it votes (hold a special prayer gathering on May 4<sup>th</sup>)
- Attend a local hustings, if there is one, to get to know your candidates as individuals (Host a hustings as a church for the local community)
- Really do try to get to know something of the policies of each of the parties and consider carefully how to place your second, regional vote.

And after the election why not invite your new MSP along to your church to find out how you can support him or her in prayer?

## Providing Support for Newer Ministers
